

## Jesus in the Neighborhood—First Church of the Brethren in Baltimore

First Church of the Brethren in Baltimore had a problem. The church needed to find a replacement for Pastor Elliot J.

Rice, who left in early 2022. Perhaps even more concerning, the church was feeling the challenges of a dwindling congregation.

Not far away, Pastor Keith Carter had a problem, too. He was leading a Baptist congregation in Maryland that had a healthy membership but lacked a permanent church home.

During First Baltimore's search process, Carter guest preached at First Baltimore and made an immediate impression. Soon thereafter, in late summer 2022, Carter was hired as pastor at First Baltimore. But he didn't come alone—he brought members of his congregation with him, blending the two groups, and declaring, "We are now Brethren."

Pastor Carter quickly got to work. He visited church members who had fallen ill and began organizing a path forward for the church. He personally helped make repairs to the ceiling in the fellowship center, and he repaired and repainted the church sign outside so well that one parishioner initially thought it had been replaced entirely. Carter also served Mother's Day breakfast for the entire congregation.





In the two years since Carter's arrival, the church has been reinvigorated. Church organizations are active and growing. Sunday school attendance and youth ministry have gotten stronger. Services have a robust music program with a choir and musicians, and church fellowship has improved. The church has expanded its community outreach, hosting an Easter Egg hunt for neighborhood children and supporting a local United Methodist church's effort to serve those in need. Attendance at Love Feast was so large, the church had to modify its plans for the foot-washing ceremony.

With these changes and hope for the future, a revitalized First Baltimore has much to be thankful for.

## **District Moderator Previews October 11 and 12 Conference**

Our District Conference theme for this fall is "Not Against Flesh and Blood," which comes from our theme verse:

Ephesians 6:12. This verse reminds us that our struggle is not with one another, or even other humans at all, but with the spiritual forces and systems of wickedness and injustice.

Our conference logo, designed by Brandi Puzonia from the Brownsville congregation, contains a variety of rich symbols from our heritage as well as the broader context of our theme Scripture. The dove is a symbol of peace but also of the empowering presence of the Holy Spirit. The stance of the dove evokes the shape of a heart, reminding

us of God's love for us and God's command to love one another. In front of the dove is the shield of faith (Eph. 6:16). The dove stands atop an open Bible, a reminder for us as Brethren that the New Testament is our rule of faith. Finally, a broken arrow lies before the dove. Arrows commonly symbolize military strength and power—in short, violence—but here the arrow is broken, reminding us that, since our fight is not against flesh and blood, we must relinquish our weapons (physical and otherwise) and relate to one another in peace.

## A Chat with Doug Veal, New District Executive Minister

On June 25, Doug Veal became Mid-Atlantic's District Executive Minister (DEM). After 2 ½ days in office, Doug made time to meet with me just before leaving for Annual Conference. Later in our conversation when he mentioned wanting to make connections and be accessible, it clearly rang true.

Doug received his BA in Philosophy and Religion, with a minor in Peace Studies from Bridgewater College. He earned a Master of Divinity (MDiv) degree at Bethany Theological Seminary and later successfully completed Clinical Pastoral Education, Level I at Eastern Mennonite Seminary, Harrisonburg, VA.

Throughout his ministry, including four pastorates, Doug has been involved at the District level. Very early in his journey, David Shumate, DEM, Virlina District, engaged him to join the District's church development team; he



served 6 years on that team, some of which as Chair. In that position he was also a member of the Executive Committee and Board. This and other activities enabled Doug to see people coming together, working across theological lines, accomplishing important work, supporting pastors and new church development. Doug's interest in District work, knowing people and hearing good things about MAD, led him to follow the call to this new position; a call to District work he had felt over several years. Doug exudes enthusiasm when he speaks of MAD's emphasis on church planting and revitalization of existing churches.

When asked about his hopes for his time as DEM, Doug shared that in his first year, he wants to get out, meeting people, pastors, and congregations and interacting with the District's Leadership Team and Ministry Teams. Building relationships between congregations and the District is important to him. He also feels there is much to be gained from congregations sharing what they are doing and working together on projects of mutual interest. Doug circled back to Church Planting and Revitalization, stressing they are two different things with similarities.

On a personal level, Doug wants to develop a better appreciation of the depth and breadth of theological understandings in the District and how they reflect the denomination. As we talked, a strong relational piece came through repeatedly. Doug wants to be accessible and welcomes any of us to be in touch. A cautionary word is that he may not respond immediately but he will respond.

So, how does Doug relax and have fun? He lives with his wife, Tasha, and their Boston Terrier, Maggy—named for actress Maggie Smith. They are settling into a new home/community and Doug mentioned proudly that 5-year-old Maggy handled the move quite well. Doug enjoys golf although he says he plays it "badly." He loves sports and watches Euro soccer, especially German, the Green Bay Packers (an influence from his mom), and Indy formula car racing. He and Tasha love reading and got their library cards before their new drivers' licenses.

There is so much more that could have been covered in our chat. However, it was day #3 and I was grateful to snag time with Doug. Lots is left for you to talk about as you get to know him. I left our time together having experienced Doug's warmth, enthusiasm, commitment to the COB and the District, and his sense of humor. I look forward to more times with him and I hope you will, too.

## Jesus in the Neighborhood—Westminster Church of the Brethren



The invitations had been hand-delivered to the door knobs of more than 200 residences in the Westminster COB neighborhood. A satellite picture of the neighborhood had been used to separate the neighborhood into distribution groups (thanks to one high tech committee member!). Yard signs were printed for pushing into the ground at the four corners of the church property. The eight members of the ice cream social committee had completed the preparatory work to get the social into motion. Before realizing it, during the several months of planning, the small two-hour "ice cream social" had evolved into more of a festival!

Name tags were printed to help our guests connect with each other, popcorn poppers were rented, and grills and grillers for cooking hotdogs were secured. Face painters and musicians had volunteered from the congregation to contribute their talents. In the early afternoon, before the event began, the microphone system for entertainers was set up by one of our church sound technicians, and free gifts were set out on a table for guests to take. Two four-square game boards were measured and drawn carefully with chalk onto the pavement next to the lanes of the three

corn-hole tosses. Chairs and light-weight tables were set around the lawn and driveway for our guests' comfort. Finally, the soft ice cream truck arrived to serve free ice cream to our neighbors.

Our churchyard was ready for a neighborhood gathering and it happened! We welcomed many guests for a fun intergenerational afternoon together—playing games, laughing, eating, and listening to music. It was a joy to hear bursts of laughter and see children and adults enjoying the challenge of eating their ice cream cones before the heat melted them away. It was wonderful seeing so many of our church members working together and sharing stories with our neighbors and friends. Together we served more than 120 ice cream cones and painted several butterflies and flowers on the faces of eager, excited children.

If one stood back and watched the activity from afar, one could see God's love coursing through the group in the energy, enthusiasm, and conversations being shared—Jesus walked among our group on that hot Saturday afternoon in June and it was good.

This will be a great opportunity for PreK–1<sup>st</sup> grade campers and parents to get a taste of summer camp during a short but fun-filled weekend.

**Shepherd's Spring** states, "We are a retreat center, summer camp, and outdoor classroom through our Global Village where we strive to engage the world, inspire hope, and cultivate lifelong learning." They are located 1.5 hours west of Washington, DC and have been hosting guests since 1990. They have simple, comfortable facilities on 220 acres in rural Maryland. Camps run from June 16 until July 30 and include a variety of camping opportunities: Global Citizen camp (July 14-19), Classic Overnight Camp (held in June), Adventure Camp (July 21-26), and Family & Grand Camp (July 14-16 and July 28-30). For those ages 7–12 who are not quite ready for the full overnight experience, there is a Day Camp that runs from July 22 to 26.

The new DEM's office is well appointed with original shelves cleaned and emptied, chairs, a large desk, a couch, and a space ready to welcome guests for appointments and doing the work of a DEM. The day I stopped in to visit I was met by the DEM's administrative assistant, Jo Ann Landon, who was working at her computer. She paused her work to speak with me about how pleased she was with the District's new office space and the improvements that had been made. As we spoke, the windows were open revealing a saturated blue sky, and I could hear the sounds of children laughing and playing in the WCOB
